#### **REPORT OF MEETING – JULY 2021**

#### JOHANNA-MAY MANKS - FASHION GURU



Our members appreciated Johanna-May's practical and down to earth approach to our wardrobe choices. She did not try to put us all into one fashion category but gave us the freedom to explore and exploit our own likes and dislikes when it came to colour and fashions and she highlighted the impetus that accessories can give our wardrobe choices. It was great for the men too as it made some of them think! Johanna-May was a knowledgeable presenter which she did with clarity and understanding of our individual approach and needs when it comes to the question of purchasing and wearing to suit our individual lifestyles.

Johanna-May highlighted that colour is the first point in our approach – it should be uplifting – so wear what suits you and it will make you feel good. She emphasised that colour makes an immediate impact first impression and creates harmony which can carry through to hair and makeup as well. The "right" colours give you a feel good factor and if you stay with your personal colour scheme it makes shopping easier and saves money.

Colour has the ability to change the impression of age – the wrong colour can be ageing - so determine the message you want to portray. Looking good does not have to be hard – a well styled Senior is impressive so own your look and have the courage of your choice, break the pattern and try something different. These things reflect your

independence. For those with a partner you can dress in a complimentary way and avoid clashing in colour and style.

Sorting your wardrobe - often a difficult task. Employ the 20/80 rule - you probably only wear 20% of your items so cull from that perspective. Do a wardrobe audit and toss, rejuvenate, modernise and make sure what you keep suits you - draw attention to your good features. The four points to evaluate:

Personality: Classic, Natural, Eclectic, Romantic or Feminine

Lifestyle: Outdoorsy, Indoorsy, Health/active, Passive, Traveller

Grooming: Hair, makeup, skincare, shoes (shoes very important)

Accessories: Scarves, Jewellery, Handbags, Walking sticks





#### DANIEL BLOOMFIELD - TRAVEL SPECIALIST



Daniel gave an amazing insight into Travel post COVID and at the same time was able to provide us with some valuable hints and tips on what and whatnot to do when it came to bookings. He had a wonderful in depth knowledge through his 22 years in the industry which no doubt was pertinent in the survival of his company during extremely difficult times. Daniel was also knowledgeable and clear in his presentation — working from a deep understanding of the current intricacies of the industry.

In the beginning it was thought that the COVID outbreak might be a 9 day wonder however it has gone on to be much more disruptive than some of the earlier hitches in the industry such as September 11, the Bali bombing, various volcanic eruptions and the like. He has refunded over half a million dollars and the estimates are there is over 2 billion NZ Dollars sitting in credit as the industry is 98% down in sales and revenue. Agents have mortgaged homes to avoid closing down but from an industry of 5,000 travel agents they are down to around 1,500.

Daniel was proud that he has managed to keep his team albeit with sacrifices. He emphasised the benefits of using a travel agent rather than online companies as they do not want to know you if challenges crop up. Airline schedules are almost nil and airlines are only selling top notch seats — nothing is cheap and

there are loads of fish hooks in arranging and rearranging because of operational difficulties – for example you cannot even stopover in Taiwan and some transit stop countries require vaccination certificates or test results – cost for a fast version of the COVID test is around \$250.

Daniel was asked about cruises and he confirmed that they appear to be in abeyance – it is an unknown so planning is impossible. They also have loads of Aussie bookings but as he said "who knows".

A much enjoyed and appreciated presentation.

#### PETER MARSHALL CNZM



Peter Marshall joined the New Zealand Police in 1972. He has held a wide range of uniform and Criminal Investigation Branch (CIB) positions in New Zealand and has commanded high-profile operations such as policing the 1999 Asia Pacific Economic Conference (APEC) and the Americas' Cup Challenges in Auckland during 2000.

In addition, Commissioner Marshall has completed overseas service, including postings to the New Zealand High Commission in Canberra and the New Zealand Embassy in Washington DC as a police liaison officer.

Commissioner Marshall was seconded to the Royal Solomon Islands Police Force (RSIPF) in February 2007 and was Commissioner of that organisation for nearly four years. His appointment as Commissioner of the New Zealand Police was announced in November 2010 and he officially started in the role on the 4<sup>th</sup> of April 2011.

In the year 2000 Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II invested Commissioner Marshall as a Member of the New Zealand Order of Merit (MNZM). In 2014 Her Majesty then invested Commissioner Marshall as a Companion of the New Zealand Order of Merit (CNZM). In addition, he has received a Royal Humane Society Award for bravery and holds various international and New Zealand Police commendations.


He is a graduate of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) National Academy in Quantico, Virginia and has undertaken business studies through Massey University.

Commissioner Marshall retired from the New Zealand Police in April 2014 after 41 years and seven months of service.

In September 2014, at the request of the New Zealand Government, he travelled to New York to make submissions in support of his country's successful bid to secure a seat on the United Nations Security Council.

In 2016 the Minister of Foreign Affairs announced that Peter was to become New Zealand's High Commissioner to the Cook Islands. He was in that role until January 2019.

He is married to Pamela, they have two adult daughters and five grandchildren.









#### I DIDN'T KNOW THAT!

**BOB EILLEBRECHT - A EULOGY** 



Bob joined SeniorNet North Shore in 2001 and spent some years tutoring Picassa and was part of our Photography group — he very much enjoyed the "outside shoot" trips and the coffee catch up afterwards but mostly he enjoyed showing his work and enjoying the photos taken by other members of the group and the comments.

Five members of the Photography group attended an afternoon at his home with his daughter and son, family and friends. His Daughter Joanne spoke about his life which began in Holland with the magnificent name of **Bernadus Joannes Hubertus Marie Eillebrecht**, but known as **Bob.** He enjoyed a beautiful childhood in a different age until war came to Europe. He experienced the occupation of his country and his family at one stage sheltered a Jewish person. He survived the starvation at the end of the war in Holland and post war spent 2 years in Indonesia in the Dutch Air Force. From there he came to New Zealand where he

became a teacher and married and became a large part of Hicks Family. Mid 30's he became a Training College lecturer and continued in that role until his retirement.

Given the continuation of increased PC engagement for remote and hybrid play, learning and work, the Windows 10, version 21H2 will use servicing technology (like that used for the monthly update process). For consumer or commercial users with devices running version 2004 or later, the Windows 10, version 21H2 update will have a fast installation experience. As this Windows 10 release is targeted for the second half of 2021, Home and Pro editions of version 21H2 will receive 18 months of servicing, and Enterprise and Education editions will have 30 months of servicing.

In addition, the next version of the Windows 10 Long-Term Servicing Channel (LTSC) based on version 21H2 at the same time will be also launched, which will have five years of servicing as announced in February this year. More information can be found in Windows lifecycle and servicing update.



#### **HOW TO PROTECT YOURSELF ONLINE!**

With increasing rate of cybercrime, data breeches being reported at an alarming rate. Tt's important to be aware of how you protect your identity and personal data online. In your offline life you're careful to shred important documents and make sure that not everything goes in the normal garbage. So why do so many people think it's okay to leave their computers and mobile devices logged in to online banking accounts? You must be diligent at protecting the information that's important to you. Here are some ways to protect yourself online.

Be careful what you share: You wouldn't trust just anyone with your personal banking information, or the key code to your house, right? Treat your online information with the same level of security, which means keeping it in a secure location and not written in a notebook by your computer or saved somewhere in your email account or on your phone. If you must share a password with someone do not send it by email and change it after.

Change your passwords regularly: It can be a pain to have to remember a whole new set of passwords, but you'll be thankful when your accounts remain secure. And make sure you choose a complex password, not just word or name can be find from dictionary.

Don't use the same passwords for multiple accounts: Websites can be compromised - that means you'll want to protect yourself as much as possible with secure passwords. If you're using the same password for your email, online banking and social networking sites you're leaving yourself open to attackers accessing multiple spaces with one piece of information.

Watch out for unusual links: I know this seems like an easy one, but every day there's a new scheme to get you to click on a link you don't recognize from a seemingly trusted source. And those masterminding these plans are getting wise, developing pages that look more and more like a legitimate resource. If you're unsure about a message or its contents, contact the sender to verify that the link is okay to click.

Lock up your portable devices: When you're done using your mobile device, computer, or tablet lock it. Better yet, have a password in place. While a 4 digit code on your Smart Phone isn't fool proof, it will still serve as a barrier between your information and the outside world.


