If it is Google you may need your Google Account or Microsoft Account for Microsoft. You may not need to use them but be a good scout and Be Prepared.

You will need paper and pen to record the steps you take so that you can fix it should it happen again.

If you have a PC or your laptop or device is too heavy for you to carry you will work on a Club computer.

He will talk about exciting developments, new apps, tips and tricks. You will learn how to manage and run your iPad/iPhone and at each session Ian will introduce new information on how the devices can be used effectively. Forgotten which model iPad you have or considering purchasing a refurbished model?

To check - find the Model Number on the back of the unit and refer to the chart.

The newer versions also display the model number under:

Settings – General – About – Model.

My iPad 2 provides a model number under settings but is not the true identifying number – for that I had to refer to the back of the unit.


For iPhones running iOS 10.3 or later:

Open the Settings app – At the top you will see your Apple ID/iCloud profile – tap that and scroll down until you see your Device and any other connected devices – “magic “ - that will show your model, Version, phone number, serial number and IMEI number.



Copy (Control-C) and Paste (Control-V) is probably the most used function among PC users. As Microsoft Windows evolves this function stays the same. Copy and Paste can only do one copy at a time into the clipboard, and once something else is copied, the clipboard is reset. ClipClip is a Free clipboard management application for Windows computers. ClipClip allows you to copy and paste anything from texts to images and files to your clipboard and save every single copy you made.

ClipClip is a clipboard management app that keeps track of everything you copy on your Windows PC, then helps you organize your clips and pastes them whenever you need. It runs in the background by default, automatically saving everything you copy with Windows' default **Ctrl+C** shortcut or clipboard menu options. Then, open ClipClip's app to see a list of everything you've copied with the time it was copied. You can search through your clips or copy any older clip to paste again now. Or, with ClipClip's paste menu, you can paste your clips into any other app anytime you want.



You can edit anything you copy with ClipClip, as well as add content to new clips. Say you copied something from a website's URL and want to keep the formatting but didn't need everything you copied. Right-click on that item in ClipClip and select Edit, or double-click the item to open the editor.

There, you'll see a Word-style editor with full formatting options. Add bold, italics, and underlines, format lists, change fonts and text size, and even edit the original HTML source code of content you copy from the web. Close the window to save the changes.

Want to save the clip as a document? Once you're finished editing, right-click on the clip inside ClipClip, and you can export any text clip as plain text, formatted rich text, or a PDF document. That's one of the easiest ways to create a formatted PDF from anything you copy on your computer.

**Tip 5: Disable SSID Broadcast**

In Wi-Fi networking, the router (or access point) typically broadcasts the network name (SSID) over the air at regular intervals. This feature was designed for businesses and mobile hotspots where Wi-Fi clients may roam in and out of range. Inside a home, this broadcast feature is unnecessary, and it increases the likelihood someone will try to log in to your home network. Fortunately, most Wi-Fi routers allow the SSID broadcast feature to be disabled by the network administrator.



**Tip 6: Stop Auto-Connecting to Open Wi-Fi Networks**

Connecting to an open Wi-Fi network such as a free wireless hotspot or your neighbor's router exposes your computer to security risks. Although not normally enabled, most computers have a setting available allowing these connections to happen automatically without notifying the user. This setting should not be enabled except in temporary situations.

**Tip 7: Position the Router or Access Point Strategically**

Wi-Fi signals normally reach to the exterior of a home. A small amount of signal leakage outdoors is not a problem, but the further this signal spreads, the easier it is for others to detect and exploit. Wi-Fi signals often reach through neighboring homes and into streets, for example.

When installing a wireless home network, the location and physical orientation of the access point or router determines its reach. Try to position these devices near the center of the home rather than near windows to minimize leakage.

**Tip 8: Use Firewalls and Security Software**

Modern network routers contain built-in network firewalls, but the option also exists to disable them. Ensure that your router's firewall is turned on. For extra protection, consider installing and running additional security software on each device connected to the router. Having too many layers of security applications is overkill. Having an unprotected device (particularly a mobile device) with critical data is even worse.

**Tip 9: Assign Static IP Addresses to Devices**

Most home network administrators use Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol (DHCP) to assign IP addresses to their devices. DHCP technology is indeed easy to set up. Unfortunately, its convenience also works to the advantage of network attackers, who can easily obtain valid IP addresses from a network's DHCP pool.

Turn off DHCP on the router or access point, set a fixed private IP address range instead, then configure each connected device with an address within that range.

**Tip 10: Turn Off the Network During Extended Periods of Non-Use**

The ultimate in wireless security measures, shutting down your network will most certainly prevent outside hackers from breaking in! While impractical to turn off and on the devices frequently, at least consider doing so during travel or extended periods offline. Computer disk drives have been known to suffer from power cycle wear-and-tear, but this is a secondary concern for broadband modems and routers.

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
